# Agricultural Report

Did you know? The earliest blooming outdoor flower that I know of is the snowdrop. I planted my bulbs some years ago and every January regardless of weather, they're up and blooming. One year I even scratched the sleet and snow away to see if they were up yet. Not only were they up, but their buds were ready to burst open. Plants are small with small, white flowers hanging their heads downward--probably so they don't have to look up at the nasty weather!

My grandparents planted their garden by the moon. Don't know if it worked or not, but there always was plenty of everything plus enough to share with others. Even today, the "Farmers' Almanac" tells you what to plant when according to the various signs of the moon.

There's a lot of weather sayings. The groundhog saw its shadow this year, and it does look like we're having six more weeks of winter. "If March comes in like a lion, it will go out like a lamb" (and vice versa). When you see a "sun dog" (a light colored spot on either side of the sun), look for rain. If only on one side of the sun, will miss us and go either north or south of

us depending which side of the sun the sun dog is. If it rains on Easter Sunday, it will rain for seven Sundays. "Red sky at night, sailor's (or farmer's) delight. Red sky in morning sailor (or farmer) take warning." A halo around the moon means it will rain (or snow) real soon. Count the stars in the moon's ring, and rain will come in that many days.

"Cows lying down in the pasture, rains coming." Count the cricket's chirps to tell the temperature. The number of heavy fogs in August, is the number of snows we'll get in winter. Cobwebs on the grass is a sign of good weather. What the weather is the first Tuesday after a new moon tells the weather for that quarter. When frogs start chirping in spring, they will be shut up by cold weather two times then the third time they chirp, spring has arrived and will stay. "Rain on Good Friday and Easter Day, brings lots of grass but little hay." I know there's many more weather sayings.

As they say, you can talk about the weather all you want, the weather will do what it wants to do. Spring, to me, is right around the corner once March is here. Even if there are nasty days in March (which there usually

The Lecturer's Department maintains a rich tradition of encouraging excellence in expressions of cultural, educational, and creative pursuits in our Granges and members. In that tradition these are the categories for competition and display for the 2018 Illinois State Session and National Contests.

2018 marks the Bicentennial of Illinois. You will find that many of the Lecturer's contests this year have an Illinois theme. It will be a treat to incorporate the unique characteristics of Illinois in our creative efforts for the year.

#### **National Contests**

\*\*\*National Contest Guidelines Subject to Change\*\*\*

Details of the National Lecturer's contests will become available after the 2017 National Session in November. Specific rules and information will be distributed via the Illinois Granger when they become available. For planning purposes, there have been three contest categories in recent years:

National Photography Con-

- Two categories: Junior (age 5-14) and Adult (age 14 and up)
- Photos must be 8"x10" or
- Categories: Charity, Friendship, Food, Barns, Pets, Patriotism, Crafting
- One entry per person, but not limited by State of repre-

#### **Quilted Items Contest**

- Unfinished Quilt Block
- Finished Fabric Quilted Items
- **Evening of Excellence Talent** Contest
- Broad range of talents

accepted: music, movement, speaking, anything you excel

• One winner from State Session can appear at the National Session in Stowe, Vermont.

Remember, this is tentative information. Look for more details after the National Session in November.

#### 2017-2018 Rules for State of Illinois **Lecturer's Contests**

- One entry per member may be submitted in each class. Must be made this Grange year.
  - Awards in each class.
- Attached to each entry must be:

Member name Grange name Specific state contest cat-

Age bracket (Juniors only) Name of responsible party (if entrant not in attendance at State Session)

- Eligibility All Subordinate and Junior Grange members. Junior entries may also include grandchildren of Subordinate members.
- Backing is required for all photos and artwork. This is so the entry will not be damaged by fingerprints, handling, pushpins, or any metal clip that will display the entry. NO FRAMES.
- Categories- There will be one category for Subordinate Grange members and 3 age groups for Juniors: 5-7 yr old, 8-10 yr old and 11-14 yr old.
- The Illinois State Lecturer reserves the right to choose to not display any entry deemed inappropriate within Grange values. Themes including nudity, obscenity, or violence.

**Photography** 

The photography contest seeks to recognize excellence in photographic images.

 Color and black and white photography will be judged in the same category.

- Only prints are accepted for judging. No slides. Prints may be made by a commercial process but must have been taken by the entrant personally within this Grange year. No altering with use of photo editing software is allowed.
- Photo size can range between 5"x7" and 8"x12". Prints must be mounted on a rigid backing, not to exceed 34" beyond the edge of the photograph. Exception: If the photo is intended to be sent to National Grange Photo contest, it should be mounted and matted according to those guidelines. Frames are not
- No professional photographers (an individual who's primary living is from photography) may enter.

This year's State photography categories celebrate Illinois. (Note an entry might also fit within a compatible National Grange Contest if you choose to enter it Nationally)

  - Illinois: City and Country
  - Illinois: Her People
- Illinois: All Living Things Entry categories in each
- Adult

**Creative Writing** General guidelines

- May be handwritten, typed, or printed from a computer. Handwriting must be legible and neat using black or blue ink pen. Typed or printed should be double-spaced, size 12 font or larger.
- Work must be original, the entrant's own creation, not copied from another source.
- •Length not to exceed 300

Creative writing prose topic: "How I Spent My Summer Vacation"

This is a familiar, and even trite "theme" for a writing assignment. Take the broadest possible inspiration and tell us about a noteworthy vacation experience, real or hoped-for.

Creative writing poetry topic: "Illinois Seasons"

Poetry can be written in free verse or in traditional forms. We're looking for poems that move us, that might make us laugh or cry, or teach us something new. Poems should note exceed one page in length.

Creative writing winning entries may be read at the Talent Show at the Illinois State Session.

Entry categories in each theme:

- Adult
- Junior, age 5-7
- Junior, age 8-10
- Junior, age 11-14 Media Arts

General guidelines

- We seek to recognize all types of visual arts.
- Work must be original, the entrant's own creation.
- No frames or glass. Fragile items are displayed at the entrant's risk.

#### Painting/Drawing/Pastels

Any subject or theme. All media (oils, watercolors, pencil, etc.) will be judged in one category. Works should not exceed 30"x30".

#### **Dimensional Media**

Any subject or theme. Sculpture, pottery, weaving, textiles, paper-making, etc are appropriate for this category and will be judged together. Works should not exceed 18"x18"x18".

#### Illinois Bicentennial Collage

Create a collage to pay tribute to Illinois and its heritage in this bicentennial year. You can use photographs, clippings, ephemera, paper cutouts, and ornamentation to create a composite image. Collages should not exceed 12"x18" and should be mount-

ed on a rigid backing such as posterboard of the same size.

#### Personal Collection

Assemble and display 12 related items. Make sure each item's relation to the collection is apparent. Provide a 50 word overview of the collection theme. All items should be anchored securely to a sturdy base or backing. The collection may be anything of intellectual or cultural interest. stamps, rocks, stickers, trading cards, dried flowers, etc. Judging will be based on interest and creativity of the collection theme.

- Adult
- Junior, age 5-7
- Junior, age 8-10
- Junior, age 11-14

**JUNIORS ONLY: Creative** 

Unconventional Materials Challenge: Illinois' Symbols

This contest is meant to stretch your creativity and resourcefulness. Use unconventional materials to create an art piece. It may be flat or dimensional. Use common things in your environment (nature, household, school). You can use anything to create your piece. Traditional techniques and materials (paper, paint, etc.) may be used but should not be the main material.

Use one of the symbols of Illinois as your inspiration. Your work can be very literal or fanciful. Symbols to draw from are Cardinal (state bird), Violet (state flower),Oak (state tree), Monarch (state butterfly), Deer (state animal), Popcorn (state snack food), and Blue Gill (state fish). Use one or multiples of these to inspire your work.

#### Web-based Project

This contest seeks to recognize creativity on the Internet. This can be a website,

continued from previous page game, information project, podcast, video, blog entry, or other web entity. Items will be judged based on overall quality, creative input, educational merit, and technical proficiency. Items should be submitted with the complete URL address. Projects will be visible for judging and inspection by public on a large screen monitor in the Lecturer's contest area.

Entry categories:

- Junior, age 5-7
- Junior, age 8-10
- Junior, age 11-14 *Illinois Banner Design*

Group Grange Competition

This competition has two purposes:

- Provide an opportunity for collaboration and group effort in creating an entry.
- Celebrate Illinois History and the unique importance of each Grange in that history.

One entry is allowed from each Subordinate Grange. Create a banner that commemorates some aspect of Illinois heritage and history combined with your individual Grange identity and influence in the community and state. The banner should be no larger than 24" wide x36" tall and hang from a dowel rod. It should be primarily constructed of fabric or soft textiles. Additional materials may be used but overall weight should not exceed 3 pounds.

This will be conducted as a judged and "People's Choice" competition. Two winners will be selected, one based on

judges' assessment and one based on voting by attendees at the State Sessions.

Create a banner that you can proudly display in your hall for years to come.

#### **Talent Contest**

The talent contest is held each year on Saturday night at the State Session. This is a great opportunity to entertain each other and share our talents.

We apply a wide definition of talents and seek to present an array diversity. Possibilities include but are not limited to:

- Music performance
- Spoken word and storytelling
  - Dance and movement
- Physical skills (juggling, baton twirling, etc.)
- Practical arts (cooking demonstration, flower arranging, coaching)

Entries should be limited to 5 minutes or less. Entries can be solo or group.


Please plan on participating in advance. Anyone who submits an entry prior to arrival at the State Session will receive a special additional prize. Include in your entry any special requirements for your entry.

Illinois will select one Best of Show talent representative to perform in the Evening of Excellence event at the National Session in Stowe, Vermont in November 2018.

Remember that all acts are representing their home Grange and presentation is a major component of any performance, so contestants are encouraged to dress and act appropriately.

#### PUMPKIN BREAD **PUDDING**

**Ingredients** 

- 2 large eggs plus 1 egg
- 1 cup canned pumpkin (not pumpkin pie filling)
- 1-1/2 cups light cream (or, half and half)
- 1 cup packed light-brown sugar, divided
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
  - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1/2 teaspoon ground
  - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 5 to 6 slices cinnamon raisin bread, crusts removed, cut into cubes to make 4 cups (see note below)
- 2 tablespoons (1/4 stick) cold unsalted butter

• Whip cream, for bread cubes. garnish

#### Instructions

• Combine the eggs and yolk in a large bowl and whisk

until frothy. Add the pumpkin, light cream, 34 of the brown sugar, vanilla, spices, and salt and whisk to combine. Add the bread cubes to the pumpkin mixture and stir gently, just until the bread is soaked and submerged. Set aside for 15 minutes.

- Preheat the oven to 350°F. Butter a baking dish. Get out a shallow casserole that is large enough to hold the baking dish.
- Bring a kettle of water to a boil, then turn off the heat.
- Transfer the pudding mixture into the baking dish. Sprinkle with the remaining brown sugar. Cut the butter into slivers and scatter them on top. Place the baking dish in the casserole. Pour enough boiled water into the casserole to come one-third of the way up the side of the baking dish.
- Bake on the center oven rack for 45 to 50 minutes, or until the pudding springs back when touched lightly.
- Transfer the baking dish to a cooling rack. Top with whipped cream before serv-

Note: Regular white bread can be substituted for cinnamon raisin bread. Add ¾ cup of dark raisins to the mixture when you soak the white
