Agriculture Report

We're still having a crazy spring--actually I think it skipped spring. April was unusually cold and wet in Southwestern Illinois--one of the coolest on record-delaying planting of crops. May has been unusually hot (high 80's and 90's) and mostly dry--the warmest May so far. Corn popped up like popcorn overnight and leaves seemed to come out on the trees overnight. Hummingbirds have arrived after their long journey back from Central America. I can always tell when they'll be here soon. Shortly after my Columbines start blooming, I know I'll see them any day. So, I've been making sugar water (1 part sugar and 4 parts water) for them. They don't come to the feeder all at once so if you have two, figure you have probably three times that many.

Has anyone seen any honeybees yet? I have white clover in my lawn and that is a buffet for them. The last few years I've seen very few bees on the white clover and so far this year I haven't seen any. Did you know our National Grange Building in D.C. has two bee hives with thousands of bees on the roof of our 11-story building?

In early America, farmers wore out the soil along the East coast and had no way to enrich it. That's one of the reasons early settlers headed West to find more rich ground to farm. Today, due to the climate getting warmer, the Plains area has moved 100 miles east.

Since my last column, a 53-year old farmer in my neighborhood lost his life due to a defective pressure hose on anhydrous ammonia. He was working on the equip-

ment and had anhydrous ammonia hooked up to the disk and tractor when the pressure from a defective pressure hose threw him into the disk. Last year near another town in my area a young man was putting anhydrous on the fields when he stopped for lunch. He had just gotten into the car to eat lunch his wife had brought him when the anhydrous hose blew and exploded. If he hadn't stopped to eat lunch, he would not have made it. A hose rubbed through against the metal. Farming is a dangerous occupation. Be careful! Shop Tips: "Save your caulking gun plastic tubes. Put them over the hydraulic hoses to prevent hose failure whenever the hose rubs on equipment. Zip ties will hold them in place. If they're going to be exposed to the sun, scuff them up and spray paint them once they're in place." "These tubes can also be used to hold drill bits in a toolbox."

"To keep oil from spilling when adding oil to mowers, generators, rototillers, and other small engines, pour the oil into a squeeze ketchup bottle" Garden Tip: "Put coffee filters in the bottom of flower pots. Excess water flows through but dirt stays put."

So, what's going on in June? Cicadas (locusts) begin to sing; raspberries, mulberries, and gooseberries begin to ripen; Tulip Trees and milkweed are in bloom; birds are carrying food to their young and fledging birds will be leaving the nest. June is also the longest day of the year (summer solstice). Plant or transplant some milkweed to help the Monarch butter-

flies. They only lay eggs on milkweed because when the eggs hatch the caterpillar only eats milkweed. If there's any milkweed in your pasture or along the fence line cows can reach, transplant it so another area since it's poisonous to cows. It has a long underground rhyzome to help in transplanting.

Wishing you enough rain to make your crops, plants, fruit, and garden grow so you don't have to water too often, blue skies, gentle breezes, and pleasant temperatures.

These same rules pertain to comments or opinions toward any public officials or members of the public.

All policies of the Grange posted on the website or page must be clearly labeled as to which Grange or level of the Grange has adopted the policies. All content, including ads, must be within the guidelines of the Digest, By-Laws of the State Grange and By-Laws of the Grange operating the website or page.

I am not aware of anything wrong being posted, but I want everyone to know and realize that the National Grange does have guidelines to be followed. This information came from Appendix G in the Grange Communication Handbook.

I hope you all celebrated the Memorial Weekend. Many Grangers served in the armed services back in World War II. Our Grange(Perryville) celebrated the returning servicemen with a special dinner at the Grange Hall on March 15, 1946. One of our members was lost in action. My father and two uncles were part of the 12 servicemen honored. Luckily I have two 8 x 10 photos of the occasion showing the most people I had ever seen in our Hall.

Last month Ethan mentioned Bishop Hill (six miles

west of Galva) as a historic site to visit in Illinois. Many Grange members of Henry County were descendants of these Swedish pioneers. In 1946 a dedication celebration was held in which Gov. Dwight Green accepted the site being taken over by the State of Illinois. Three members of Galva Grange were members of "Old Settlers organization" planning the three-day program. An article in the Illinois Granger August 1946 issue stated that County Center Grange and Henry County Pomona used the old brewery and bakery building of the Swedish Colony as their meeting place. Also County Center Grange assisted financially with some projects of the site.

I hope you have been reminiscing about your past or current Juvenile/Junior Grange activities. If you could write up a history and submit to me, I will include it in my Junior Grange notebook.

Legislative Report

Hello brothers and sisters.

While in Springfield on April 11th, I was advised that there was talk in the Department of Agricultural, so I did a little research and this is what I dicovered.

The Department of Agriculture provides an array of subsidies for farmers and imposes extensive regulations on agricultural markets. It operates the food stamp and school lunch programs, and administers numerous subsidy programs for rural areas. The Forest Service is within the Department of Agriculture.

The department will spend \$146 billion in 2018, or \$1,150 for every U.S. household. The department operates 278 subsidy programs and employs 90,100 workers in about 7,000 offices across the country.

DownsizingGovernment.org. is a project of CATO Institute in Washington D.C.

Below are some of the areas that they think should be downsized.

Downsize This!

• Agricultural Subsidies. The department provides up to \$30 billion annually to farmers of corn, cotton, rice, soybeans, wheat, and

other crops. It also aids farmers with research, loan, and insurance programs.

- Agricultural Regulations and Trade Barriers. The government regulates domestic markets for products such as sugar and milk, and it imposes trade restrictions on various farm products.
- Rural Subsidies. The department runs numerous subsidy programs for businesses and individuals in rural areas.
- Food Subsidies. Most of the department's budget goes toward food subsidies, including the food stamp and school lunch programs.
- Forest Service. The Forest Service oversees 193 million acres of forests and provides subsidies to businesses and state governments.

"Cato is on the right track with its proposals to downsize the USDA. Many of the department's programs originated in the Great Depression and are completely out of date and no longer needed, if they ever were. Downsizing the USDA would help move American agriculture into the 21st century."
