National Grange Session will be November 9-13 in Wichita, KS. Don will be Conservation Committee, and I am on Agriculture Committee. We will be starting this next week with zoom calls for the committees to review present policy. I can't wait. The Peterson Farm Brothers will be there as well as former FCC Chairman Ajit Pai and Kansas Secretary of Agriculture Mike Beam. We will be discussing the National Grange Building. GRIT important points I shared

Are you getting emails from the National Grange for the Patrons Chain or the View from the Hill? If not make sure your email is in the National Grange database. Make sure your secretary or Robin have the correct emails, so that the database is up to date. Have you looked at the National Grange DATABASE and started to update your Grange's information, birthdays or at least year. This information is needed for benefits that we could be eligible to get via National Grange. Look often at the National Grange for Benefits. Loretta Washington works hard to have new benefits available to us.

Any Grange wanting to use the IL State Grange Zoom license just let me or Karie know. Granges can meet this way, State Committees and any other Grange group can meet this way. Just make sure we can set you up. It only takes a few minutes if you decide at the last minute to hold the meeting that way.

Each Grange should have a copy of the Illinois State Grange Bylaws [(each Grange had been given copies in 2015), They were in a blue binder and National Grange Digest of Laws, the book is on the NationalGrange.org. If you need copies let me know. Since the Digest has been reviewed several years ago I have started a Bylaws committee Trisha Renken has agreed to be chair. This committee will be updating the Bylaws – any questions or concerns please check with them. Talk to Trisha or myself if you are interested in serving on the committee. The meetings will start in January and will probably mostly be held via Zoom. I would like to have at least a basic report for the next State Session. If you need a copy please contact me via email and I'll send you a current copy.

G Bills – thanks to all of you for your support to the Honor Memorial Scholarship Fund. Remember the Scholarship fund when a member passes away or if anyone wants to make a donation. Scholarships will be available to Grangers who have been Grangers 1 year and pursuing a college or trade school. The interest is not that great. Please consider making donations to the Honor Memorial Scholarship fund. We will give the G bill collection a break for a while.

Promote your Grange in any public media you can — Let others know what you are doing in your community — that is the key to a happy healthy Grange — and a happy healthy Grange gets new members. Work with other Granges and Grangers it only makes us stronger. RALI — Rx Abuse Leadership — those Granges want more of the bags for disposal of old prescriptions please let me know. We will do a request for more of them. Let me know the number you need/want for your Grange. Work with your local pharmacy for setting up your own drug take back day or a day to distribute the drug disposal bags. Promote that day and time. Great EASY community service project.

Illinois appears in many of the magazines. Make sure you renew subscriptions in a timely manner. Look on the label to see when you will expire.

All the deputies are now appointed as membership directors. I will be holding a Zoom meeting for all the deputies. Grange Foundation is looking for more board members. Taxes – eform 990 – keep them current. Need any help, please contact me or Karie or Robin.


We are leaving for National in a week so next month I'll have information about National session.

All Junior Contests - Individual must be a Junior, or 1+ member

Three age groups: 5-7, 8-10, 11-14. Entry age as of 1/1/2022 (National Guidelines)

Any entry that is not labeled and does not follow rules may be disqualified from judging, but may still receive a participation ribbon.

Maximum size is given in measurements of length-by-width-by-height

<u>Mini-Juniors:</u> Any child who is 5 by September 1, 2022 may send up to 3 entries to session. These projects will not be judged as other age groups are, but will receive participation ribbons.

Junior at Heart: Any Granger over the age of 20, as of September 1, 2022, may submit a project. These projects will be voted on by fellow Grangers for Best of Show.

- 3. Market Baskets:
 - a. Must fit 30" table length
 - b. Must be set up by entrant or representative
- 4. Antique Poster
 - a. Must Include Pictures of said Antique
 - b. Antique must be at least 100 years old.
 - c. Must Include an Explanation of Antique, and its use, etc...
 - d. Size of Poster must not exceed 22"x28"




