National Grange Ex Comm has signed a purchase agreement with Somera Capital East, a DC developer. Their study period runs until September 29, after which time we can be pretty sure that they will finalize the deal. Fingers crossed until then. If everything goes well, NG staff will be moving to a different floor in the building and settlement will take place October 30.

National Grange has been awarded a large grant by US Aging to support vaccination in cooperation with the Association of Consulting Pharmacists, managed by McUlsky Health Force. We hope to fulfill all the requirements of this grant with participation at the Big E, the Eastern States Exposition in Massachusetts, September 15 -October 1. Thanks to the Northeast Region State Granges, we will be delivering free COVID, flu, and other vaccinations at the fair every day on the lawn of the Grange Building there. Hopefully they have been able to give 5000 vacinations to meet the goal of the grant.

The Grange Foundation has voted to no longer accept donations for the Kelley Farm. For the last eight years the Foundation has received very little in contributions and have learned that the Farm no longer has any mention of the Grange in their displays. They do not have the Grange meeting set up in the house or any Grange displays in the visitors' center. Of course, Granges are welcome to send donations directly to the Farm if they wish, but Foundation or NG will no longer serve as middleman.

Another grant, PCORI -- Preparing Seniors for Surgery, also requires all Granges to participate by pre-

senting a program that we will provide. The name of the program is "Reaching Rural Seniors with Pre- and Post-Surgical Information Through an Underutilized Trusted Messenger" (Grange). We will be producing videos, brochures, flyers, surveys, etc. similar to our cancer program three years ago. Every Grange will receive materials to present a program on preparing seniors for surgery and questions to ask the doctor.

The big kick-off of the program will be at Convention in November. Packets will be mailed to every Grange, and our job as State Presidents will be to encourage every Grange to present the program for the public. The first 500 Granges will each receive \$100 to assist with their event, and State Granges who coordinate with us to urge their Community Granges to participate will receive \$500. Joan Smith is the project manager for this grant, and she will be contacting you to check on your progress. Our grassroots organization makes us the perfect vehicle for disseminating this vital information for senior citizens.

Broad Hollow Grange News

At Broad Hollow Grange's first Friday August potluck, David and Cindy Vogler presented a program on Iceland, "Land of Ice and Fire," a trip they took this spring. A quiz tested our knowledge of Iceland. The winner received a candy bar from Iceland printed in the Icelandic language. They showed interesting and informative information through many beautiful scenes of waterfalls, geysers, mountains, ice fields, volcanic areas, glaciers thermals, etc.

Most people live along the coast in small towns of about 2,000 with Reykjovik the largest city. Since gas stations were few and far in between, they were glad their hybrid car got 60 miles per gallon. They showed information on the country's geology, heritage, industry, geothermal and hydropower that provides their energy, and growing vegetables in greenhouses. When early settlers arrived, about 35% was forests but due to using the trees for firewood, buildings, and the sheep overgrazing the land, only 1% of the forest remains so there are very few trees. They shared that wildlife is sparse on the island. One 2-lane paved road circles the island and bridges and tunnels are only one lane even if the tunnel is miles long. The traffic light system is different than ours with lights changing to get ready to go. One town's traffic lights are heart shaped. Speeding results in an \$800 fine. Pictures of a meal included fish, lamb, and dairy as their main dishes. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the presentation and learned a lot about the island of Iceland.

The program opened with the song, "School Days " then everyone recited the "Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag."
