The hope is that some of the items will be for sale and others will be available for a donation, and more decisions will be made. Thanks Gene for your efforts.

Leaders Conference was held in Myrtle Beach in February, President's Day weekend. Don and I attended Friday – Sunday. Friday morning I had National Grange Executive Committee meeting. There were great workshops on leaders intent, team building, vision and mission setting, mental health, and strategic planning. I hope to share with you some of these concepts at a IL Leadership meeting on April 6 via a Zoom conference open to any Granger. It will be 9:30 – noon. Also I will be contacting some of the officers and committee leaders to see if they have information to share.

Brian Keller, member of Enterprise and Emerald Mound Granges has been appointed as the new state Grange Secretary. Plans are being made to get him installed and working with the bank for the secretary account transfer. Information will be forthcoming when all is ready. Continue working with Robin until we have everything ready for Brian. Thanks to Robin for her service to ISG during this transition and Brian for accepting the position.

The National Grange grant for Patient Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI) Eugene Washington PCORI Engagement Award (EADI #30051) for a program entitled "Reaching Rural Surgical Seniors." "This program provides local Community Granges the resources to educate and inform their areas about what senior citizens should be doing to prepare for surgeries – before the surgery and when they return home," Joan Smith, project manager said. "There's also a comprehensive 'Preparing for My Future' guide, with questions that any adult should think about. It covers topics from where bank accounts are located and what kind of care you're willing to have, to who in your community might be able to help you with certain activities post-surgery." National Grange information on this program will be sent from National Grange soon. I updated the President and Secretary address information for each Grange. BLAST FROM THE PAST

I am happy that our February weather has been quite mild. It is still my goal to declutter some things around my house. Can you believe I am still finding "Grange" items tucked in places! Yes, I think you can determine that I am a "Grange Hoarder"!!

I found a business card of Kermit W. Richardson, 20th National Grange Master in a briefcase I had. He was elected on November 15, 1995. He and his wife Margaret were selected Vermont State Grange Young Couple of the Year in 1957. He also served as National Chaplain, Lecturer and Overseer.

Then there was an envelope with two photos from Ruth Temple. It was the Winnebago County Pomona Grange Degree Team in 1950 or 1952. I got the magnifying glass to see if I could attempt to come up

with names. The second pic was of the Graces and their Court. Luckily, I already had a similar photo which my mother had written out all the names. Easy, but the other photo was very small but I did make out two escorts—from Perryville Grange-my mother Alice Peacock and former Grange member Evelyn Gustafson. Ironically a few days later I received a text from Evelyn's daughter that Evelyn passed away at the age of 103.

Then there was a whole page of the October 1977 Illinois Granger announcing all the winners from the Director of Women's Activities, Phyllis Pagles. That year the theme was "Say it With Music". Phyllis reports that the biggest project of the year was the Sewing Contest. Their quota was 900, which they surpassed with 937 entries. Two went on to win at the National level. Also, the Stuffed Toy Contest was well received, 45 Granges participated sending 442 at the State level. I recognized many of the winners' names of the various contests that year. There were so many very talented sewers, bakers, and crafters.

I love finding these Grange hidden treasures. Now, I must get busy adding them to my notebooks.

Don't forget this is for YOUR YOUTH the future of The Grange. Without everyone's help with our fundraisers and donations none of this would have been possible.




Lecturer and from that change Lindakay Ebel was nominated to be Chaplin. All positions were approved as nominated.




BOWLING GRANGERS!!!


Three Illinois Grangers are excelling in Bowling! Two at the High School level and one at the College Level.

Legislative Report

Hello Brothers and Sisters

March is here with more bad news from our Governor. **February 23, 2024**

Governor proposes \$1 billion in new taxes to cover free healthcare and housing for non-citizens



SPRINGFIELD – Gov. JB Pritzker delivered his annual Budget Address Feb. 21, proposing a billion dollars in tax increases to fund the growing costs of the migrant crisis that he created in Illinois.

Even as grocery prices hit a 30-year high, the Governor's new tax increases would hit families yet again by cutting their standard tax deduction. His plan would also go after small and large jobs creators, leaving Illinoisans earning less, paying more for goods and services.

Senator Dave Syverson (R-Cherry Valley) says since taking office, Pritzker has increased spending on non-citizen programs from just a few million dollars per year to now over a billion dollars, by offering free healthcare and housing to non-citizens. Also, the cost for education, social services, and crime-related expenses for this population adds another \$1 billion hit to Illinois taxpayers.

Senator Syverson says increasing taxes on working families already hit hard just to fund free healthcare and housing for non-citizens is wrong and clearly shows the Governor's misplaced priorities.

"This does not end well for Illinois if not stopped! Overall, the Governor's spending would set a new record as the largest budget in the state's history – \$53 billion," Syverson said. "Pritzker's budget calls for \$2 billion in new spending. That is on top of the \$14 billion he has already increased in spending over the last six years."

Senator Syverson said he is committed to fighting this proposed billion-dollar tax increase stating, "These dollars belong to the taxpayers who earned it and can spend it more wisely than this Administration can."

Senator Syverson is asking for help from the public to tell Pritzker "NO" to these new tax hikes by signing his petition at https://senatordavesyverson.com/say-no-to-tax-hikes-petition/.

Chaplain's Corner


