1 lb Imitation crab legs

1 lb Imitation crab meat

1/2 cup red onion chopped

2 TBls minced garlic

1 lb spaghetti

2 large jars classic alfredo sauce

2 pkgs shredded parmesan cheese

Panko crumbs

Parsley flakes

Paprika

In Crockpot

Layer

Med shrimp

Crab legs cut in one inch pieces

Imitation crab meat broken apart

Add onion & minced garlic

Break spaghetti into 2 inch pieces

layer on top

Pour the 2 jars of Alfredo sauce plus one jar of water

Broad Hollow Grange News

Broad Hollow Grange's first event of the new year was a first Friday potluck on January 3rd. The hall was decorated for the January theme with snowflakes and snowmen. After the potluck, a New Year's program took place. Various toasts to the new year were read, participants told about New Year traditions around the world, there were New Year's jokes, and what food is eaten around the world for good luck. There was a New Year's Quiz with the program closing with a resolution.

In January, Broad Hollow Grange #1806 was 104 years young. Broad Hollow Grange was organized by Eugene and Dosia Eckert from Woodland Grange who at that time was the Illinois State Grange Master. Broad Hollow Grange was organized on January 20th, 1921, with 35 charter members and was the 1,806th Grange in the state. For several months members met in the Broad Hollow one-room school. Within several months so many people joined the Grange that it was decided to build a large hall. In the fall of 1921, the Grange moved into their new hall, and a Junior Grange was also organized for ages 6 through 16, Broad Hollow Junior Grange was the 3rd one organized in the state of Illinois. In the 1950's, Broad Hollow Grange received an award for being the largest Grange in the state with well over 100 members. Broad Hollow Grange continues to be a driving force in the community welcoming visitors and new members for activities and meetings.

Turkey Hill Grange is proud to announce that one of our members, Emma Rutledge, a senior at Belleville East High School, will have a handmade quilt block in The Next Giant Leap Quilt Block Challenge 2025. Retired astronaut Dr. Karen Nyberg is its sponsor. The finished quilt will be displayed at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington D.C. It is part of The Arts Breaking the Sky Festival held March 28-April 13, 2025.

Dr. Karen Nyberg stitched a star quilt block while in space on the International Space station for 166 days.

She encouraged others to make star quilt blocks while she was on her ISS mission. NASA received 2,400 quilt blocks that were assembled into 28 king-size quilts. Those quilts are housed at the Briscoe Center for History at the University of Texas.

Since retiring from NASA, Dr. Nyberg has pursued a career in textile arts. This new contest is inspired by the Artemis Mission that will return astronauts to the Moon. Students were asked to submit a block related to Artemis with one block per state being chosen for the Lunar Quilt. Dr. Nyberg says, "Innovative textiles, sewing expertise and design skills are vital to the space program. I'm excited that this challenge will make young art students aware of these new career paths."

The quilt with Emma's block will be on display at the Kennedy Center from March 28-April 13, 2025. Emma is the daughter of John and Stacy Rutledge of Belleville, IL.

No frames or glass. Fragile items are displayed at the entrant's risk.

Painting/Drawing/Pastels—Any subject or theme. All media (oils, watercolors, pencil, etc.) will be judged in one category. Works should not exceed 30 in.x 30 in.

Dimensional Media—Sculpture, pottery, weaving, textiles, paper-making, etc. are appropriate for this category and will be judged together. Basically this is any artwork that is not flat on a canvas or paper. Works should not exceed 18"x18"x18".

Nature Collage—See website

Personal Collection—See website

Handcrafted Holiday Tree Ornaments—3 ornaments. Ornaments can represent any holiday or season, should not be identical but should be related by theme or technique. Ornaments will be judged on craftsmanship, creativity, and appearance.

Ornaments involving primarily fabric, sewing, needlecrafts, etc

Ornaments using other materials or techniques

Birdhouse—Any materials or decorations. It can be completely functional or completely decorative. It should be scaled appropriately, have doorway, nesting chamber, roof, perch of some sort so that theoretically a bird could live in it. Entries will be judged on workmanship and visual appeal. Creativity in materials and decorations is encouraged.

Sending our love, support and hugs to everyone who needs them.




Ronald A. Wait 1944—2024 Flora Grange

No frames or glass. Fragile items are displayed at the entrant's risk.

Painting/Drawing/Pastels

Any subject or theme. All media (oils, watercolors, pencil, etc.) will be judged in one category. Works should not exceed 30"x30".

Dimensional Media

Any subject or theme. Sculpture, pottery, weaving, textiles, paper-making, etc. are appropriate for this category and will be judged together. Basically this is any artwork that is not flat on a canvas or paper. Works should not exceed 18"x18"x18".

Art Journal

"Art journaling is an open-ended form of art on loose paper or in a bound journal where the focus is on the process of creating and of self-expression rather than a particular end result." This is a very free form form of expression, using any techniques of drawing, writing, painting, coloring, pasting, cutting, etc. that you want to include. The goal is to present something interesting, challenging, beautiful, thought-provoking. I'll be publishing some more information about this later in the year for those for whom this is a new idea. It is something that is accessible to anyone of any age. Entry should encompass from 2 to 6 pages, loose or bound.

Nature Collage

A composite presentation of aritcles taken from nature arranged and mounted to create a visual image—either representational or abstract. Entries will be judged on overall effect, variety of materials, and creative design. Materials may include leaves, dried flowers and plants, twigs, feathers, eggshells, etc....basically anything that occurs naturally

without being manufactured. Collages may be any size but should be no larger than a standard poster board. All items must be securely attached to a sturdy backing.

Personal Collection

Assemble and display 12 related items. Make sure each item's relation to the collection is apparent. Provide an overview of the collection theme not to exceed 50 words. All items should be anchored securely to a sturdy base or provided with a box or material on which to display them. The collection may be anything of intellectual or cultural interest: stamps, rocks, stickers, trading cards, dried flowers, postcards, etc. Judging will be based on interest and creativity of the collection theme.

Handcrafted Holiday Tree Ornaments

Use your skill to make three ornaments suitable for decorating a tree. Ornaments can represent any holiday or season. The ornaments should not be identical but should be related by theme or technique. Materials and methods can be anything you choose. Ornaments will be judged on craftsmanship, creativity, and appearance. Because of the high response to this category, there will be two divisions:

Ornaments involving primarily fabric, sewing, needlecrafts, etc.

Ornaments using other materials or techniques

Birdhouse

Craft a birdhouse. You can use any materials and any style of decoration. It can be completely functional or completely decorative. It should, though, be scaled appropriately and have doorway, nesting chamber, roof, and perch of some sort (that at least, theoretically, a bird could live in it. Entries will be judged on workmanship and visual appeal. Creativity in materials and decorations is encouraged.

Origami Animals

Create three animals from paper folding techniques. Items can be any size. (There are lots of websites and books from the library with instructions for paper folding.)
