
As always please bring a side dish to pass and please bring something for the auction. Don't forget your Western attire.

I recently read this article about the dandelion, that it's the only flower that represents the three celestial bodies of sun, moon and stars. The yellow flower resembles the sun, the puff ball resembles the moon and the dispersing seeds resemble the stars.
